IDAHO'S TOP-FIVE UNIQUE HOT SPRINGS EXPERIENCES

Natural hot springs are a fun way to explore nature and relax at the same time. Idaho has more than 100 hot springs; some are completely untouched while others have been changed with devices like covers, "plumbing" and developed pools with temperatures that range from 90 to 150 degrees. These five unique hot springs offer an unforgettable travel experience and are worth a weekend visit.

1. **Lava Hot Springs** in Southeastern Idaho are the most recognized hot springs in the state. It was once a winter village site for Native Americans. Even on the coldest modern winter days, guests can enjoy the hot pools with an average temperature of 107 degrees. Water circulates through the pools and back to the Potluff River, keeping the pools clean. Spend a day relaxing in the pools for just \$7.50 per person or enjoy a relaxing massage. Family, weekday and annual pass specials are available. Some of the hotels in Lava Hot Springs also have access to the hot springs mineral water and have soaking tubs available for their guests.

2. **Burgdorf Hot Springs** was established in 1870 and is located near the historic ghost town of Warren. It features two immense, sandy-bottom pools and the remnants of cabins and an old hotel can be seen surrounded by the beautiful Fayette National Forest. If you'd like to stay the weekend, Burgdorf offers 18 rustic cabins for rent that range in age from 70 to 132 years old. Lodging costs \$35 for the first person, per night, and access to the springs is \$5 for per adult.

3. **Miracle Hot Springs**, located near Hagerman, offers guests public and private pool experiences indoors or out with professional massages available for hire. Along with two outdoor pools, there are 19 private soaking rooms that are a great option for adults and couples. Take an extra few days and rent one of the on-site domes for a relaxing vacation. Private pool rates are \$10 per pool for two hours.

4. Conveniently located between McCall and Boise, **Gold Fork Hot Springs** has six chlorine-free, mineral-rich pools and hydromassage. The hot springs are open daily from noon to 9 p.m. and until 11 p.m. on Saturdays. Credit and debit cards aren't accepted, so be sure to bring cash for a minimal entry fee of \$5 for adults and \$3 for children.

5. **Givens Hot Springs** offers day camping and has historic cabins to rent, making it a great family-friendly weekend getaway. For hundreds of years, Native Americans wintered in the area and eventually Oregon Trail pioneers homesteaded here. The Hot Springs feed into a naturally heated pool perfect for swimming and relaxing. The Snake River is nearby, with endless opportunities for fishing, rafting and additional recreation.

The amenities at Idaho's hot springs range from scenic views of the Sawtooth Mountains to hydro-massages or mineral baths. Taking a dip in a hot spring is a naturally therapeutic, budget-friendly and unforgettable experience. Take advantage of the Coeur d'Alene Resort's Floating Green Spring Golf Package.
